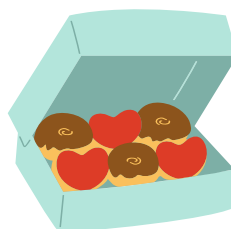

A NOTE FROM PASTOR EMILY:

This is a month of transition.

Our kids are in their last days of school, finishing projects, writing papers, getting ready for finals, and longing for the first day of summer break. Our seniors feel this transitional time even more acutely, aware that this is the last time they will go to these classes, in these buildings, with these friends. Everything changes next year.

Our weather is definitely in transition. Some days it can't seem to decide if it's destined to be a cool spring day or a broiling summer one. Some days we get both, with forty degree temperature swings.

The church is also in transition as we move from the proclamation of Easter, of hearing those stories of a wounded, and yet somehow living, Christ, to the so-called Ordinary Time of the church year. You know what I'm talking about. Just like the long growing season in the south, we will be in the green season for this next little piece of forever.

I have on occasion heard this liturgical season called the Time of the Church, and, truly, I like this nomenclature quite a bit better than Ordinary Time (or worse, the Time After Pentecost). It seems to me to better capture what this time actually represents for a faithful body of Christ seeking to live out and live into that Easter message that we celebrate and proclaim for fifty days. Of course, every Sunday is a "little resurrection celebration", but we also move beyond the static celebration of "Alleluia, he is risen", to the practical question of, "Now what?"

This is the season in which we focus on those scripture stories that begin to answer that question of purpose in the life of a disciple. We learn what it means to live as a follower of Jesus, as someone who seeks and strives to know God and to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. This is the season when we hear stories of healing, teaching, and speaking on behalf of the voiceless.

This is the season in which we study what it means to work in and for the kingdom of God.

Christ is Risen, Alleluia. He has drawn the whole church into himself: raising, redeeming, and resurrecting our relationship with God. He has taken away the fear of the tomb and given each of us new life. Now let's go and do something with it.

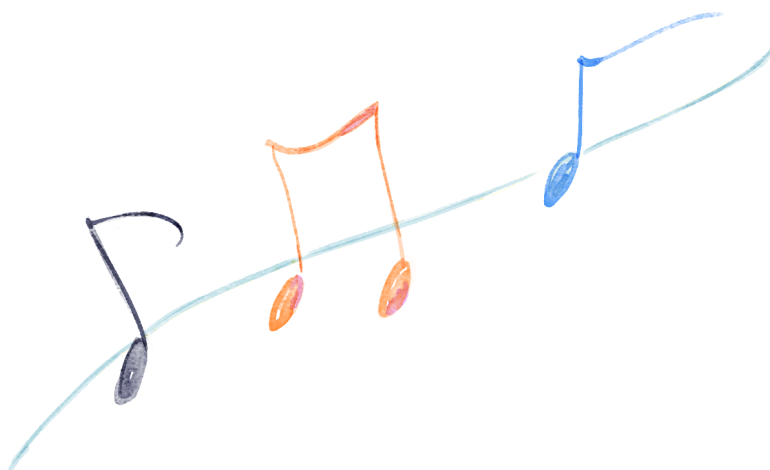

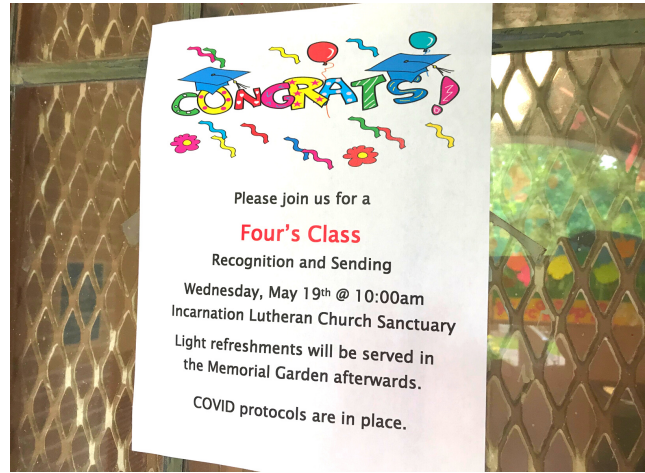

Summer is also a great time to learn fun recipes! Here is one awesome recipe you can make at home with your parents and it makes the perfect summer snack!

Muddy Buddies

9 Cups Chex Cereal (your choice)

1 Cup Chocolate Chips

1/2 Cup Peanut Butter

1/4 Cup Butter

1 Teaspoon Vanilla

2 Cups Powdered Sugar

1. Add the Chex cereal to a large mixing bowl.
2. In a separate, smaller bowl, add the chocolate chips, peanut butter, and butter.
3. Place the bowl in the microwave and cook for 1 minute and stir.
4. Continue to cook in 30 second increments until the mixture is completely melted. Stir in the vanilla.
5. Pour melted chocolate over the cereal.
6. Use a spatula to gently stir until all of the Chex are coated.
7. Add the powdered sugar to a gallon size ziplock bag.
8. Scoop in the chocolate cereal mixture.
9. Seal the bag and shake to coat.
10. Pour dessert over wax paper to cool, store in a sealed container for up to five days.

COVID-19 Updates for Worship

ILC COVID Protocols for Worship

May 2, 2021

A task force of church staff and members started meeting early in the pandemic to determine best practices for reopening. We have refined these guidelines to meet the updated medical information available now, one year into the pandemic. At this time, the buildings are open for use. We will continue to update and modify our protocols based on recommendations from the CDC. Here are the current guidelines to follow:

- Anyone experiencing or exhibiting Covid-like symptoms should stay home.
- Church will provide hand sanitizer, available around the sanctuary. Attendees are encouraged to take advantage
- Masks must be worn while inside.
- Single use paper and communion materials are required.
- Social distance best practices strongly encouraged – no shaking hands, no hugging, stay 6' away from all but your own family.
- Sit 6' away from other family pods
- Minimal singing, and only with all wearing masks
- When weather permits, open windows to increase ventilation.

Safety Precautions

- CDC handwashing guidelines will be posted in bathrooms
- Facilities will be cleaned thoroughly on a regular basis
- Hand sanitizer will be provided

COVID-19 Updates for Meetings

ILC COVID Protocols for Meetings

May 2, 2021

A task force of church staff and members started meeting early in the pandemic to determine best practices for reopening. We have refined these guidelines to meet the updated medical information available now, one year into the pandemic. At this time, the buildings are open for use. We will continue to update and modify our protocols based on recommendations from the CDC. Here are the current guidelines to follow:

- Anyone experiencing or exhibiting Covid-like symptoms should stay home.
- Adults present are responsible for ensuring compliance
- Ensure that meetings held inside church buildings can accommodate family pods at six-foot distances. For planning purposes, each room will hold approximately the following numbers of people. Please do not exceed the number needed to ensure this protocol is met -- the number will vary by each room.
 - CDC Second Floor -- 45
 - Reception Hall -- 30
 - Conference Room -- 6
 - Kitchen -- 3
 - Up, In and Out Room -- 10
 - Parlor -- 8
- Utilize hand sanitizer, which is available in every room
- Masks must be worn while inside.
- Discourage the use of materials that must be handled by multiple people not in the same household.
- Social distance best practices strongly encouraged -- no shaking hands, no hugging, stay 6' away from all but your own family.
- Sit 6' away from other family pods
- Minimal singing, and only with all wearing masks
- When weather permits and where possible, open windows to increase ventilation.

Safety Precautions

- CDC handwashing guidelines will be posted in bathrooms
- Facilities will be cleaned thoroughly on a regular basis
- Hand sanitizer will be provided

1940's Fun Facts

INCARNATION AT 100

Each month of the 100th anniversary year, Contact will feature "Fun Facts" about the history of Incarnation. This month features fun facts from the 1940s.

The Years of World War II: 1941-1945

Incarnation began the 1940s worshipping in the little stone sanctuary, built in 1928. The original wooden sanctuary now served as a "Parish Hall," providing Sunday School space for youth and children. Adults held Sunday School classes in the sanctuary.



Palmer Pierce, pastor of ILC from 1939-1941

Popular pastor Palmer Pierce received a one-year leave of absence to serve as a military chaplain in early 1941. Little did either he or the congregation know that it would become a permanent "leave" after Pearl Harbor on December 7th.

Pastor George Elias Meetze was called in June 1942 at a salary of \$2000 a year, plus \$200 for housing and \$10 for gas and oil. He would remain Incarnation's pastor for over thirty years.

In July 1942, the Council purchased two tons of coal for heating the church and planned to get more as soon as they could see "how much the bin will hold."

The church took out "War Risk Insurance" in September 1942 of \$20,000.

Pastor Meetze wrote monthly newsletters to Incarnation's men in service during the war, keeping them up to date on each other and on the home front.

Incarnation's veterans, pictured in the sanctuary on their return at War's end. Five members were killed in the conflict.

War hysteria and discrimination against Asians and Asian Americans led to the threatened internment of Incarnation charter member, Mitsuo Tokunaga. Reportedly, it was the actions of Pastor Meetze and the Church Council which prevented this from happening.

The Ladies Auxiliary worked hundreds of hours at the Red Cross during the War.

The sanctuary was open all day for prayer and evening worship on "Invasion Day," June 6, 1944.

Easter services in 1945 were a marathon, lasting from a 7:00 am Sunrise Service through an 8:00 pm "Senior Choir Easter Cantata".

Moses Cook, long-time Incarnation custodian, went into the streets ringing a hand bell in celebration on VE Day, May 8, 1945.

Incarnation sent large sums of money to "Lutheran World Action" beginning in 1945. LWA was formed to help rebuild Europe and resettle "Displaced Persons," ("DPs").

Incarnation shipped approximately 2000 pounds of supplies to a Bavarian congregation assisting refugees in war-torn Germany in 1948 and 1949. The Lutheran League (youth group) sent clothes to Russia.

More fun facts from the 1940s

The Post-War Years: 1946-1949

Incarnation adopted a “parish abroad” in **Tung Nan Ti Kiachow District, China**, in the mid-1940’s, until it fell into Communist hands and became unreachable. In an important decision for Incarnation’s future, they adopted a new parish in Liberia.

Incarnation began broadcasting its services in June 1945 on a new radio station WKIX (later WIS radio).

The Ladies Auxiliary and the Women’s Missionary Society merged into the “Women-of-The-Church” in 1946. The Men’s Brotherhood, Luther League, Young People’s Society and multiple choirs all became increasingly active.



The first meeting of Boy Scout Troop 8 took place in February 1946. Cub Scouts formed later that

year, and a Girl Scout troop formed in 1947.

In 1947, Incarnation helped purchase **Lutheridge!** The church enthusiastically sent almost \$500 toward the purchase of a “Lutheran Summer Assembly Ground near Arden, NC”.

In 1948, the women of the church supported **Konnarock Lutheran Mountain Mission School and Rocky Boy Indian Mission School** with over 300 pounds of clothing, medical and school supplies and monetary donations.

In April 1948, twelve members of Incarnation transferred to help form **Resurrection Lutheran Church** off of Rosewood Drive, which was newly organizing.

In the summer of 1948, a polio epidemic cut Sunday School attendance by two-thirds.

The choir rejoiced to finally receive new choir robes in **December 1948** in time for Christmas services – the need had been “urgent”. Men’s robes cost \$9.50 each and women’s \$10.50. Hats for the women were an additional \$2.50 a piece.



After years of consideration, Incarnation voted **140 to 24** to build a new educational building in September 1948. Groundbreaking took place the next year, on September 25, 1949.

Congregational “sentiment” led to the preservation of “the persimmon tree” in front of the new proposed building. The Property Committee was directed to take all “necessary steps to protect said tree.”
